
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

I have heard of people raising the roof. REVELL has to be different. We raise the floor.


My day would not be complete without at least one S. O. S. from the Drafting and Art Department. They have our Westwood Blue Boy turning green.



Max Cooper, our Receiving Supervisor, and family spent their vacation in Carmel. Just think! They missed the heat wave. Lucky Max!


Lila Jane Ellis spent her vacation in Michigan and Ohio, Phil Ewing and family vacationed at Lake Tahoe.
